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# Community Programs Report

#### Community Response Bureau (CRB) Functions:

The function of the Community Response Bureau is to foster and preserve open avenues of communication between the Department and the diverse communities it serves in an ongoing effort to identify, understand and solve the contemporary public safety problems facing those communities. Community Response Bureau oversees a variety of outreach initiatives which include the Community Liaison Officers, the Recruitment Section, the Police Athletic League. the School Resource Officers, Crime Prevention Through Design (CPTED), Nixle, Operation Medicine Cabinet, Gun Buy-Back programs, and Impact Truancy. Additionally, Community Response Bureau coordinates language access resources for the Police Department, formulates and updates the Language Access Plan, conducts community satisfactions surveys, and acts as the central repository of community relations information for the Police Department.

#### Community Response Bureau Programs:

#### **COMMUNITY LIAISON OFFICER:**

The Community Response Bureau added 7 Community Liaison Officers (CLOs) to serve as a bridge between law enforcement and the communities they serve. CLOs work with an array of individual community members, advocacy groups, business owners, school officials, and other governmental agencies to enhance community relations and to help identify trends and patterns of countywide community issues.

CLOs assigned to the CRB are detailed out to each of the 7 precincts in the Police District. They host and attend regularly scheduled community meetings, visit with citizens and organizations to increase crime awareness, crime prevention, and safety. They also coordinate with our School Resource Officers (SROs) to assist in providing training which is relevant to the communities served, and often assist in identifying at-risk youth populations. The CLOs focus their efforts in communities most in need of assistance, and provide a highly visible and accessible representative of the Police Department

#### **LANGUAGE ACCESS PLAN:**

The Community Response Bureau, developed the Police Department's Language Access Plan (LAP), in order to assist all individuals with limited English proficiency. The CRB actively distributes the LAP in both English and Spanish throughout the Police District, posts it on the SCPD website, and displays it in each police facility open to the public.. The CRB acquired

40 new Language Line handsets for installation throughout the police district, and has developed a Special Training Bulletin, 14-02d, which highlights all language access services, including a new conference calling function provided by Language Line Services. Memo Book inserts were also developed and distributed to all Department members explaining how to access Language Line in any situation. Community Response Bureau has also begun translating 10 vital documents, (8 public and 2 internal) into the 6 most commonly spoken non-English languages in Suffolk County. The Community Response Bureau meets with Language advocate representatives and Community groups quarterly in order to better serve LEP individuals and to request input regarding the Language Access Plan to ensure that it is addressing the needs of the Latino community.

#### SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER PROGRAM:

CRB School Resource Officers (SROs) will continue conducting the following presentations to high school and middle school students: Prescription Drugs to Heroin, Gangs & Associated Violence, Diversity & Tolerance, Cyber Law, Alcohol & the High School Student, Social Host & Pre-Prom, and Vehicle Survival-Behind the Wheel. The top priority of CRB is to present these topics in high schools and middle schools throughout the police district, and it is the Bureau's goal to be available to any school that requests assistance. Presentations are offered to elementary schools as SROs' schedules permit.

Community Response Bureau SROs and Precinct SROs meet on a bi-monthly basis to share information and conduct training. The objective is to ensure all SROs possess the most upto-date information/intelligence concerning the schools in which they work. Officers are also provided the most current versions of presentations being offered. This approach has enhanced the consistency of and the information provided to students.. (Attachment # 1)

#### NIXLE:

The Community Response Bureau in a coordinated effort with the Police Technology Bureau and the Public Information Section has utilized Nixle Alert System to disseminate information to the public in both English and Spanish. Community Liaison Officers, COPE officers and School Resource Officers are advertise upcoming events, such as precinct monthly meetings, festivals, parades, updates on current police activity to alleviate community concerns, through the use of Nixle. CLOs, COPE and SROs are also actively advertising the availability of Nixle alerts to community groups, church groups, school administrators and parent-faculty groups. Although Nixle maintenance is not the responsibility of Community Response Bureau, CRB will continue to advertise the availability of the alert system in Spanish newspapers and promote its availability at community meetings and events. #### CRIME PREVENTION THROUGH ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN:

The goal of Crime Prevention Through Design (CPTED) is to reduce opportunities for crime that may be inherent in the design of buildings and neighborhoods. A Community Response Officer trained in CPTED assesses the physical design of buildings including: landscape plans, lighting, access control, security features, traffic control and safety improvements. Upon request, the Bureau will conduct CPTED site surveys for schools and businesses, which can assist with crime reduction and quality of life issues.

#### HUNTINGTON STATION COMMUNITY AND BUSINESS DISTRICT OUTREACH:

The Huntington Station Community and Business District Outreach Program is a pilot program recently started in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Precinct giving targeted enhanced community policing to the Huntington Station residents. Community Response Bureau developed this program which surveys residents on specific issues and offers CPTED information to business owners in the area. Two CRB officers have been assigned to work directly with CLO and COPE officers in Huntington Station to conduct a door to door survey of residents to create a dialogue between the community and the police department. Additionally, a crime prevention officer has been tasked to engage every business in the Huntington Station area in order to provide recommendations and pertinent educational materials for safe business practices. A Spanish speaking officer was specifically selected to assist in the residential survey portion in order to maximize engagement of the Latino community. This program will be duplicated in other communities within the police district during the 2015 calendar year. (Attachment #3)

#### **HEROIN OUTREACH PROGRAM:**

Community Response Bureau has coordinated with the William Floyd School District to present Heroin Awareness to the parents within the Mastic, Mastic Beach and Shirley communities. CRB officers along with representatives from Seafield Rehabilitation Center, and Coalition for Social Justice reached a district wide audience. A School Resource Officer presented information on heroin and prescription drug awareness geared toward parents. Seafield presented information on in-patient and outpatient resources and explained differences between 28 day treatment programs and long term programs. A representative from Coalition for Social Justice explained Narcan and its uses, demonstrated how to use the opiate inhibitor and then distributed it on request. The program was highly successful and will be expanded to other districts upon request.

#### RECRUITMENT:

The SCPD Recruitment Section is responsible for actively recruiting qualified candidates to consider a career in law enforcement with the Suffolk County Police Department. Recruitment practices are continually analyzed and enhanced to determine the most effective measures. Recruitment Section maintains liaison with colleges and community groups for referrals in qualified candidates. Special emphasis is directed toward recruiting Latino, African-American, and other minority candidates, including Spanish speaking candidates, for the 2015 entrance examination. #### SUFFOLK COUNTY POLICE ATHLETIC LEAGUE:

PAL is a recreation oriented organization that utilizes sports and recreational activities to tighten the bond between police officers, youth and members of the community. The PAL program enables more than 20,000 children to engage in a variety of sporting events and recreational activities. The goal of PAL is to engage our youth in hopes of decreasing the lure of gangs, drugs, and delinquent behavior. PAL officers will continue to conduct and enhance the Department's PAL program in 2015. Expand

#### **IMPACT TRUANCY:**

The Community Response Bureau, in cooperation with William Floyd High School and the Education Assistance Corp. (EAC), conducted a truancy reduction program called IMPACT TRUANCY. Several Community Response Bureau Officers (CLOs, SROs) met after school with 9th grade students who were identified by administrators as intra-day truants; students who go to school in the morning, but then skip their assigned classes. Research has shown that the transition years (9th and, 6th grades) are an important time to identify students who are beginning to skip classes or school entirely.

The Community Response Bureau CLOs and SROs conveyed the importance of finishing high school and facilitated various exercises with students and counselors from EAC. The program assisted students in identifying their specific needs in order to better prepare them for school. The program continues to be well received.

#### **I-DENT-A-KIT:**

During 2014, 420 children were fingerprinted and received I-DENT-A-KIT packets, designed to assist investigators in cases of missing or abducted children.

#### S.A.V.E (SCHOOL ACTIVE VIOLENCE EMERGENCY):

The Community Response Bureau continued implementing the School Active Violence Emergency (S.A.V.E.) Program. This program streamlines the police response to an actively violent school situation. As of October 30, 2014, S.A.V.E. hotline numbers have been installed in 29 public school districts within police district. The program is running with live phones in 27 of these districts, where 276 phones have been installed in 183 school buildings. Two remaining districts with 31 buildings, and a college with 3 buildings are in the implementation process. In addition, 7 private schools are utilizing the program, 2 with live hotline phones in their buildings. Community Response Bureau will continue to be responsible for coordinating the implementation of this program and will act as a liaison between these schools and the police department.

#### CRASH COURSE IN CRASH AVOIDANCE:

This program is a half day safe driving instructional course for teenagers between 16-19

years old. The goal of this program is to educate teenagers in avoidance measures under dangerous driving conditions. During July, 2014, SCPD Emergency Vehicle Operation Course instructors provided one week of instructional driving courses, offering 2 sessions per day, which allowed more than 120 teenagers to complete the program.

#### **OPERATION MEDICINE CABINET:**

In a continuing effort to address the increase of heroin use among young people and ensure the proper disposal of unwanted or expired medications, the Suffolk County Police Department initiated a permanent, continuous drug reclamation program. The SCPD was the first police department in New York State to offer the public the option of disposing unwanted pharmaceutical drugs 24 hours a day, seven days a week. In 2014, over 6,070 pounds of unwanted pharmaceutical drugs were deposited at the seven police precincts. Since the program's inception in July 2010, over 19,500 pounds of medications have been collected. This program will continue in 2015.

#### **GUN BUY BACK:**

In 2014 the Suffolk County Police Department conducted 2 gun buy-back events. A total of 126 weapons were collected, including 9 assault weapons, and 30 high capacity magazines.

# Satisfaction Survey Report

The Suffolk County Police Department Community Survey was developed to determine the Latino communities' satisfaction with the Department's service to LEP individuals in those communities. The survey, which is distributed in both English and Spanish, gauges the ease of communication between the respondant and the police, whether a request for language assistance was made, and whether or not it was provided. The survey further measures the level of satisfaction with any language assistance provided, as well as the overall level of satisfaction regarding the police service provided.

Additionally, the survey asks the respondant to describe relations between the Department and the community, whether they were treated respectfully during encounters with police officers, if they felt they had been a victim of racial profiling by the police, and their level of certainty that the Department will take and fully investigate a complaint against one of its own officers for police misconduct. The survey seeks the level of awareness of Department programs and gauges the level of satisfaction respondents experienced in these programs. The survey inquires about the level of safety individuals experience in their neighborhood, their perception of crime rates in their neighborhood, services they would like to see more of, and a ranking of

specific community issues by importance to the respondant. Finally, the survey asks for comments and recommendations from the respondant, allowing for a free-form dialogue.

The SCPD Community Survey is distributed by Community Liaison Officers, COPE, School Resource Officers, and line police officers to various groups throughout the police district. is available at each of the seven precincts and is distributed to local libraries, given to leaders and attendees at community meetings, delivered to local businesses and to church services. Going forward, the Police Technologies Bureau is in the final stages of constructing an on-line platform to allow electronic submmission via the Department's website.

More than 1,000 surveys were returned between early October and the second week of NovemberThe Research and Development (R&D) Sectionhas been tasked with the collection, maintainence and production of the data gleaned from the surveys. Once a sufficient data pool is available for annual analysis. The R&D Section will provide the Community Response Bureau with all data points necessary to conduct a thorough analysis. While this pool has yet to be established, the CRB conducted a sample analysis of the 1,000+ surveys on hand. The written comments on every survey were reviewed., tabulated on a spread sheet, and sorted by the precinct indicated on the survey.

These comments touched on a wide range of concerns such as; better police response time, higher visibility, , more Spanish speaking officers, and more officers in general Comments included suggestions that officers receive more sensitivity training, adjust their attitude anddemeanor, employ better communication skills, pay more attention to the community, and advertise police/community programs better Although no specific allegations of police misconduct necessitating further investigation were reported, some comments raised issues such as racial profiling and stereo-typing.

The information gleaned from the sample analysis has been disseminated to the Police Commissioner and the command staff, as well as to the Precinct Commanders. (Attachment #5)

# Community Meeting Summary

#### Community groups at meetings with Police Commissioner or his designee

The SCPD Deputy Police Commissioner, Risco Mention-Lewis, attended nearly 150 community related meetings, events, and training sessions between 04/01/14 and 11/1/14. Deputy Commissioner Lewis has also presented several training sessions to SCPD CLO, COPE and SRO personnel on Enhanced Community Relations and Policing. Commissioner Mention-Lewis participated in several outreach programs specializing in youth intervention such as the Council of Thought and Action (COTA) at the Wyandanch Resource Center, and the Bellport Leadership and Parent Meeting. Additional outreach meetings/efforts

specifically geared toward the Latino community included a presentation at Touro Law School with Erica Edwards of Make the Road New York, a presentation given at the Hispanic Society / Brentwood Community Meeting, and a presentation at the Long Island Youth Mentoring Center in Brentwood.

Community meetings regarding outreach for housing resources were attended in Gordon Heights, the Shinnecock Nation and the Tudor Oaks Task Force. Additionally, Deputy Commissioner Mention-Lewis met with Superintendants from the Brentwood, Copaigue, South Huntington, Wyandanch, Huntington, Amityville, and Central Islip School Districts regarding youth intervention and outreach. Deputy Commissioner Mention-Lewis routinely met with COTA groups in Bellport and Wyandanch and coordinated with Community Liaison Officers to identify 'at-risk yout and assist them in gaining employment during the summer months, followed by the continued monitoring those individuals at the start of the school year to encourage the importance of continuing their education. #### First Precinct:

The First Precinct held nine Precinct Community Meetings between 01/01/14 and 11/01/14. The meetings were held at the West Babylon Library and were open to all members of the community. Representatives of the First Precinct provided recent crime stats and trends to those present and afforded community members a forum to express particular areas of concern regarding quality of life issues. Additionally, First Precinct officers including CLO and COPE personnel attended a variety of other community meetings, such as Lindenhurst Chamber of Commerce, Wyandanch Weed & Seed, Town of Babylon Fire Chiefs, Wheatley Heights Civic Association, neighborhood watch groups, etc. where concerns and issues could be raised by community residents. The First Precinct addressed concerns raised by assigning patrol checks under the Patrol Check System, targeted enforcement by uniform and plain clothes officers, MDC notifications to First Precinct personnel, and referrals to other agencies, such as Babylon Town and Babylon Village for solutions when appropriate.

In addition to attending community meetings the Community Liaison Officer, COPE and other First Precinct personnel attended and participated in numerous community related events and outreach efforts. These included parades, fairs/festivals, cooking classes, youth camps, bike rides, and concerts to name a few. Additionally, First Precinct CLO and COPE personnel worked closely with political figures and Town of Babylon Parks Department on a revitalization project for the Wyandanch Park to help improve the quality of life for Wyandanch residents.

#### **Second Precinct:**

The Second Precinct held nine Precinct Community Meetings between 01/01/14 and 11/01/14. The meetings were held at the Huntington Public Library and were open to all members of the community. Representatives of the Second Precinct provided recent crime stats and trends to those present and afforded community members a forum to express particular areas of concern regarding quality of life issues. Additionally, Second Precinct officers including CLO and COPE personnel attended a variety of other community meetings such as COTA, Tri Community and Youth Agency, Maggie Matters, and Source the Station/Huntington Station Renaissance, neighborhood watch groups, etc., where concerns and issues could be raised by community residents. The Second Precinct addressed concerns raised by assigning patrol checks under the Patrol Check System, targeted enforcement by uniform and plain clothes officers at complaint locations, MDC notifications to Second Precinct personnel, and referrals to other agencies such as Town of Huntington when appropriate.

In addition to attending community meetings the Community Liaison Officer, COPE and other Second Precinct personnel attended and participated in numerous community related events and outreach efforts. These included parades, fairs/festivals, cooking classes, youth camps, bike rides, and concerts to name a few. Additionally, Second Precinct personnel including the Community Liaison Officer, COPE and School Resource Officers attended a variety of other community related meetings, including Walt Whitman Mall Homeland Security Meeting, Huntington Station Renaissance Meeting, Town of Huntington Community meeting, etc., providing additional forums for community concerns to be raised. The Second Precinct in a coordinated effort with Community Response Bureau has been conducting community outreach in the form of door to door surveys and business CPTED information in Huntington Station, addressing concerns voiced by the residents in that area.

#### Third Precinct:

The Third Precinct held nine Precinct Community Meetings between 01/01/14 and 11/01/14. The meetings were held at the Third Precinct and local Public Libraries depending on the month, and were open to all members of the community. Representatives of the Third Precinct provided recent crime stats and trends to those present and afforded community members a forum to express particular areas of concern regarding quality of life issues. Additionally, Third Precinct officers including CLO and COPE personnel attended a variety of other community meetings, such as those held at the El Salvador Consulate, and the Ll Women Empowerment Network Officers met with religious leaders, local political leaders, business owners, civic associations and neighborhood watch groups, providing additional forums for issues to be raised. The Third Precinct addressed concerns raised by assigning patrol checks under the Patrol Check System, targeted enforcement by uniform and plain clothes officers at complaint locations, MDC notifications to 3rd Precinct personnel, and referrals to other agencies, such as Islip Town and for solutions when appropriate.

In addition to attending community meetings the Community Liaison Officer, COPE and other Third Precinct personnel attended and participated in numerous community related events and outreach efforts. These included parades, fairs/festivals, youth camps/basketball games, police explorers, and concerts to name a few. Additionally, Third Precinct CLO and COPE personnel worked closely with political figures and Town of Islip Parks Department on a revitalization project with the Central Islip Coalition of Good Neighbors help improve the quality of life for Islip residents by building a playground for area youth.

#### Fourth Precinct:

The Fourth Precinct held nine Precinct Community Meetings between 01/01/14 and 11/01/14. The meetings were held at the Smithtown Public Library and were open to all members of the community. Representatives of the Fourth Precinct provided recent crime stats and trends to those present and afforded community members a forum to express particular areas of concern regarding quality of life issues. Presentations were given by specialized commands to educate the public in regard to their duties and ability to help the community. Additionally, Fourth Precinct officers including CLO and COPE personnel attended a variety of other community meetings, such as the Commack Community Association, and the Ronkonkoma Civic Association, and met with religious leaders, local political leaders, business owners, civic associations, school officials and neighborhood watch groups, providing additional forums for issues to be raised. The Fourth Precinct addressed concerns raised by assigning patrol checks under the Patrol Check System, targeted enforcement by uniform officers at complaint locations, MDC notifications to Fourth Precinct personnel, and referrals to other agencies, such as Town of Smithtown for solutions when appropriate.

In addition to attending community meetings the Community Liaison Officer, COPE and other Fourth Precinct personnel attended and participated in numerous community related events and outreach efforts. These included parades, fairs/festivals, youth camps/basketball games, police explorers, and concerts to name a few. Additionally, Fourth Precinct Crime Section, COPE personnel, and SCPD Highway Patrol worked diligently in addressing issues due to tumultuous behavior and overcrowding at bars and clubs in the Smithtown area. The efforts continued through mid-summer concentrating on the times that activity was at its peak to help the quality of life for Smithtown residents.

#### Fifth Precinct:

The Fifth Precinct held nine Precinct Community Meetings between 01/01/14 and 11/01/14. The meetings were held at the Patchogue-Medford Public Library and were open to all members of the community. Representatives of the Fifth Precinct provided recent crime stats and trends to those present and afforded community members a forum to express particular areas of concern regarding quality of life issues. Additionally, Fifth Precinct officers including CLO and COPE personnel attended a variety of other community meetings, such as the Bellport Community Meeting, HELP Suffolk, the Ronkonkoma Civic Association, South Country Leadership, and the Lighthouse Mission. The Fifth Precinct addressed concerns raised by assigning patrol checks under the Patrol Check System, targeted enforcement by uniform and plain clothes officers MDC notifications to Fifth Precinct personnel, and referrals to other agencies, such as Brookhaven Town and Patchogue Village for solutions when appropriate.

In addition to attending community meetings the Community Liaison Officer, COPE and other Fifth Precinct personnel attended and participated in numerous community related events and These included ESL classes, parades, fairs/festivals, outreach efforts. youth camps, organized youth basketball leagues, assisted with homework at Bellport Boys and Girls Club, and concerts to name a few. Additionally, Fifth Precinct CLO and COPE personnel worked closely with Patchogue-Medford Youth Services and Patchogue Village to organize and host Police Day for Patchogue Summer Youth Camp Program where representatives from SCPD Emergency Service, Canine, Aviation gave presentations, the Police Academy addressed bicycle safety, an Highway Patrol provided a car-demo.. CLO and COPE officers provided handouts for the campers and their parents in both English and Spanish and provided a Spanish speaking officer for interaction with Spanish speaking participants. success of this event, it has been requested that it become an annual part of the Patchogue Summer Youth Camp Program.

#### Sixth Precinct:

The Sixth Precinct held nine Precinct Community Meetings between 01/01/14 and 11/01/14. The meetings were held at the Sixth Precinct, One More for Jesus Church, and at the Gordon Heights Fire Department and were open to all members of the community. Representatives of the Sixth Precinct provided recent crime stats and trends to those present and afforded community members a forum to express particular areas of concern regarding quality of life issues. Additionally, Sixth Precinct officers including CLO and COPE personnel attended a variety of other community meetings, such as the Blue Ridge Homeowner's Association, Port Jefferson Station/Terryville Civic Association, Farmingville Residents Association, Coalition to Preserve the Heritage of Gordon Heights, neighborhood watch, and various other community groups providing additional forums where issues could be raised by community residents. The Sixth Precinct addressed concerns raised by assigning patrol checks under the Patrol Check System, targeted enforcement by uniform and plain clothes personnel, MDC notifications to Sixth Precinct personnel, and referrals to other agencies, such as Town of Brookhaven and Port Jefferson Village for solutions when appropriate.

In addition to attending community meetings the Community Liaison Officer, COPE and other Sixth Precinct personnel attended and participated in numerous community related events and outreach efforts. These included parades, fairs/festivals, cooking classes, youth Easter egg hunts, bike rides, and concerts to name a few. Additionally, Sixth Precinct CLO and COPE personnel worked closely with Pastor Cruzate of One More For Jesus Church and Gabino Ramirez of Gabino's Diner, arranging an EAC Car Seat Program where approximately 30 car seats were given out and installed in the Farmingville area to Hispanic families in need of car seats.

#### Seventh Precinct:

The Seventh Precinct held nine Precinct Community Meetings between 01/01/14 and 11/01/14. The meetings were held at the Seventh Precinct and were open to all members of the community. Representatives of the Seventh Precinct provided recent crime stats and trends to those present and afforded community members a forum to express particular areas of concern regarding quality of life issues. Additionally, Seventh Precinct officers including CLO and COPE personnel attended a variety of other community meetings, such as Pattersquash Creek Civic Association, Mastic Beach Village, Sound Beach Civic, and the Unkechaug Tribal Council. The Seventh Precinct addressed concerns raised by assigning patrol checks under the Patrol Check System, targeted enforcement by uniform and plain clothes officers, MDC notifications to Seventh Precinct personnel, and referrals to other agencies, such as Brookhaven Town and Village of Mastic Beach for solutions when appropriate.

In addition to attending community meetings the Community Liaison Officer, COPE and other Seventh Precinct personnel attended and participated in numerous community related events and outreach efforts. These included parades, fairs/festivals, cooking classes, youth camps, bike rides, and concerts to name a few. Additionally, in early November, 2014, Seventh Precinct CLO and COPE coordinated with the Village of Mastic Beach Code Enforcement, Probation, Parole, and Suffolk County Department of Social Service in effort to improve the quality of life in Mastic Beach. In response to community quality of life complaints, officers worked closely to identify problem homes in Mastic Beach which were frequently referred to them by area residents for complaints and concerns. The operation which entailed visiting

these residences with Mastic Beach Code Enforcement, Fire Marshall, Parole, Probation, DSS resulted in several arrests for drug possession and warrants, fines imposed to landlords for safety/code violations, assistance with heat and services to at least one residence, the closure of one home due to the extent of violations and safety issues, where the tenants were assisted with temporary housing by the Department of Social Service representative.

## Success Report

#### Community Response Bureau Successes:

The Community Response Bureau engaged in many projects and programs with great success during 2014. The CRB has continued with existing programs and initiated some exciting new programs. The assignment of a Community Liaison Officer to each of the seven precincts allows our bureau to have contact with the various communities within our police Preference in these personnel assignments was given to officers with bi-lingual capabilities relevant to the area in which they work. The CLO's along with precinct COPE personnel have mapped their resources within the precinct boundaries and have continued to expand their community outreach efforts. The CLO's description has been posted to the website along with their contact information and hours of availability.

The Community Response Bureau has completed and has been actively distributing the Language Access Plan in both English and Spanish to assist community members with Limited English Proficiency. This plan will be reviewed on a continual basis and we will continue to seek feedback from the Latino community in an effort to assess and make amendments when Community Response Bureau has coordinated the translation of documents posted to the and obtained 40 new Language Line handsets which are being installed in Department buildings. CRB has issued Training Bulletins that explain how to utilize Language Line Services, and has Memo Book card inserts to all Precincts. (Attachment #14) CRB has posted signage in English and Spanish at all Precincts, Impound, Court Liaison, Property, Marine Bureau and Airport Operations. (Attachment #15) In addition, English/Spanish versions of Missing Person Guidelines, Halloween Safety, Bicycle Safety, information have been posted online, and revisions have been made to the SCPD Coloring Book (both languages in same book), Swim Safety and Social Host information. The Compliment Complaint Form has been revised to reflect the Spanish Complaint line phone number and the added language "Spanish speaking operator will be available". CRB coordinates and publishes Nixle alerts, available in both Spanish and English, and CLO, COPE and SRO personnel actively advertise the

availability of Nixle as an alert system to keep the community informed of upcoming events, current issues and ongoing police activity in their precinct.

The Community Survey was completed and distributed to solicit feedback on satisfaction with SCPD services and language access. The Community Survey will be disseminated in an ongoing basis to continually assess the satisfaction of the Suffolk County community with the Police Department.

The Community Response Bureau has successfully launched several pilot outreach programs. Particularly, the Heroin Awareness Program held at schools is very well received and addresses an issue indicated in every precinct county wide. This program will be replicated in other districts during the upcoming year. Additionally, the Huntington Station Community and Business Outreach Program has been successfully received by the Huntington Station community. This program will be initiated in other communities in the police district next year to continue targeted community outreach.

#### Community Response Bureau Areas Requiring Improvement:

Although the Community Response Bureau has experienced significant success during 2014, there are several areas that require some improvement. To date, a certification process and incentive plan for Department Authorized Interpreters has yet to be established. Once this has been accomplished, a comprehensive training effort will make the interpretation process uniform across the police district. The Department must also expand its offerings of supplemental language training to officers in areas with significant LEP populations. To that end the CRB is considering Rosetta Stone, Spanish on Patrol, educational re-imbursement and other initiatives for 2015.

Another area requiring improvement is the development of a unified system of documentation for Community Response Bureau outreach efforts. Although Community Response Bureau is the centralized hub of community outreach, the majority of the work is completed at the precinct level involving the CLO's, SRO's and COPE officers. Each precinct has its own unique method of documenting issues raised, the manner in which they have been addressed, as well as the numerous other outreach efforts provided on a daily basis. To rectify this, CRB is working closely with the Police Technology Bureau to develop a database platform to bring uniformity to the reporting and maintenance of community related data.



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



**Sliding Glass Doors Secured** Cover with security window film to help prevent shattering. Use track locks to prevent removal of door.

**Casement or Double Hung Windows** Use various types of window stops for windows.

**Exposed Fonce Hinges** Ensure "pin" side is installed

on inside of fence or fill with pins that cannot be removed.

Trim Hedges and Trees Trim hedges below 2' and tree canopies higher than 6'.

**Reinforce Basement Windows** Ensure there is a quick-release mechanism for easy exit in case of emergency.

Interior Lights & Radio

A couple of lights and the sound of a radio can make it seem as though someone is home.

**Easily Readable House Number** 

It's easier for police and other first

responders to locate your home when

the house numbers are large & well-lit.

Door Eye Viewer / Window Ensure both adults and children can see out before they open a door.

Reinforce Door Frame With Wood

Fill space between door jamb & studs with a solid piece of wood and shims to prevent it from being pried back.

> **Porch / Front Door Lights** Use high efficiency lights with motion sensors or a timer. Use a white light source that offers good color rendering. Lights should be installed out of arm's reach of a would-be criminal.

> > Deadbolt Locks on Doors

Deadbolt at least 1' into door frame and strike plate installed with at least 3" screws

> Driveway and **Walkway Lights** Use high efficiency lights with motion sensors or timers.

**Garage Door Securely Locked** Do not leave a spare key outside your home. Leave with a trusted friend.

# Make your Business Safer

Every business owner, manager and employee plays a part in making businesses safe. Here are some things you can do to help prevent robbery:

- Have at least two employees open and close the business.
- Do not release personal information to strangers.
- · Keep purses and personal valuables locked in desks or lockers.
- Install a robbery alarm.
- Place a surveillance camera behind the cash register facing the front counter. Replace videotapes regularly.
- Vary times and routes of travel for bank deposits.
- Don't use marked "moneybags" that make it obvious to would-be robbers you are carrying money for deposit.
- Keep a fow balance in the cash register.
- Place excess money in a safe or deposit it as soon as possible.
- Cooperate with the robber for your own safety and the safety of others.
- Consply with a robber's demands. Remain calm and think clearly. Make mental notes of the robber's physical description and other observations important to law enforcement officers. If you have a silent planm and can reach it without being noticed, use it. Otherwise, wait until the robber leaves.
- Be careful, most robbers are just as nervous as you are.
- Keep your business neat and clean. A tidy, orderly place of business is inviting to customers, but not to robbers.
- Stay alert! Know who is in your business and where they are. Watch for people who hang around without buying anything. Also, be aware of suspicious activity outside your place of business. Write down license numbers of suspicious vehicles if visible from the inside of your business.
- Make sure the sales counter can be seen clearly. Don't put up advertisements, flyers, displays, signs, posters or other items on windows or doors that might obstruct the view of the register from inside or outside your business. The police cruising by your store need to see in.
- Try to greet customers as they enter your business. Look them in the eye, and ask them if they need help. Your attention can discourage a robber.
- Keep your business well-lit, inside and outside. Employees should report any burned-out lights to the business owner or manager. Keep trees and bushes trimmed, so they don't block any outdoor lights.
- Encourage the police to stop by your business.
- Learn the names of the officers who patrol your business.

Make sure another employee inside the business keeps you within eye contact while you are involved in work details outside of your building.

If you see something suspicious, call the police. Never try to handle it yourself. It could cost

you your life.

Do not cancel alarm calls - allow the police to respond!

- Handle cash carefully. Avoid making your business a tempting target for robbers. Keep the amount of cash in registers low. Drop all large bills right away. If a customer tries to pay with a large bill, politely ask if he or she has a smaller one. Explain that you keep very little cash on hand.
- Use only one register at night. Leave other registers empty and open. Tilt the register drawer to show there is no money in it.

• Leave blinds and drapes partially open during closing hours.

- Make sure important signs stay posted. For example, the front door should bear signs that say, "Clerk Cannot Open the Time Lock Safe."
- If your business is robbed put your safety first. Your personal safety is more important than money or merchandise.
- Don't talk except to answer the robber's questions.
- Don't stare directly at the robber.
- Prevent surprises, keep your hands in sight at all times.

Don't make any sudden moves.

- Tell the robber if someone is coming out of the back room or vault or working in another area of your business.
- Don't chase or follow the robber out of your place of business.

#### Dear Resident/Business Owner:

When an emergency arises, police, ambulance and fire personnel need to be able to locate your home or place of business quickly. In such circumstances, every second can be critical. If emergency personnel have difficulty locating your home or place of business because your street address number is not prominently displayed, vital emergency aid will be delayed.

If you received this letter, a member of the Police Department noticed that your street address is not prominently displayed on your residence or place of business. Please help emergency personnel to help you by following the guidelines listed below.

#### DISPLAYING STREET ADDRESS NUMBER ON ROADSIDE MAILBOXES

Size: The display of reflective block-style number(s) (minimum of (3) inches) on the mailbox is recommended.

Visibility: Be certain that decorations, shrubbery, or the mailbox flag do not obstruct the posted number(s). Also, it is important to display the number(s) on both sides of the mailbox.

It is also very important to have your street address number displayed on your residence/building, especially if your mailbox is not located directly in front of residence or building.

#### DISPLAYING STREET ADDRESS NUMBER ON RESIDENCE/BUILDING

Size: The larger the number(s), the greater the visibility. The display of reflective block-style number(s) (minimum of six (6) inches is recommended. Decorative "script" number(s) may be attractive, but they are difficult to read from the street.

Color: The color or the street address number(s) should contrast from the house/building color.

**Location:** Street address number(s) should be displayed above or near the front entrance and/or above or near the garage door if the garage door faces the street.

Please display your street address number conspicuously. Help us to help you when you have an emergency.

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

#### I. PROPOSITO

#### II. POLIZA

La misión del Departamento de Policía del Condado de Suffolk es proveer y mantener un ambiente seguro en el cual gente puede vivir y trabajar. Cada miembro del Departamento reconoce su obligación de proveer servicios profesionales dando ayuda a los que la necesiten, proporcionando un ambiente libre de temor, llevando ante justicia a los que violan la ley y protegiendo a todas personas y propiedad de acuerdo con normas legales e éticas.

#### A. Evaluando las Necesidades de la Población LEP y Idiomas

Miembros del Departamento de Policía del Condado de Suffolk, incluyendo pero no limitado a Despachadores 911, Oficiales de Policía e Investigadores pueden entrar en contacto con personas con LEP al contestar llamadas al 911, respondiendo a o investigando delitos, ayudando a miembros del público a través del teléfono y en encuentros informales. El Departamento documenta estos contactos mediante el uso de entradas de despacho asistido por computadora, informes de incidentes, y declaraciones, así como otros formularios e informes requeridos por el protocolo del departamento y por la ley.

El Condado ha identificado los siguientes seis idiomas más comunes que se hablan por las personas con conocimientos limitados de inglés en el Condado de Suffolk: español, chino mandarín, polaco, italiano, portugués y criollo haitiano. La demanda de servicios de interpretación experimentadas por el Departamento en el año calendario 2013 refleja una necesidad de 90% en el caso español, la necesidad de un 3,5% para el chino mandarín, una necesidad de 1,0% para el criollo haitiano y una necesidad de 1,0% para polaco

Para asegurar que todos los residentes puedan tener acceso al mismo nivel de servicio, el Departamento mejorara y / o implementara las siguientes políticas y procedimientos:

- 1. - f. Crime Victim Information Report (PDCS-8105) / Reporte de Victimas de Crimen
- g. Compliment Complaint Information Report (PDCS-1300-1) / Informe de Agradecimiento / Reclamo
  - (1) El Compliment Complaint Information Report / Informe de Agradecimiento / Reclamo, PDCS 1300-1a-SP, será aceptado por el Departamento cuando está terminado en idiomas distintos al inglés.
- h. Mental Health Assistance Notification (PDCS7146c) / Notificación de Asistencia para Salud Mental
- 3. El Departamento mantendrá Language Identification Charts / Gráficos de Identificación de idiomas en todas instalaciones públicas y carros policiales.
- 4. En casos de analfabetismo o idiomas el cual materiales escritos no han sido traducidos, tales formas y documentos serán leídos a individuos LEP (Dominio Limitado de Inglés) en su primer idioma por un Intérprete Autorizado del Departamento o por el servicio Language Line.
- 5. Enlaces estarán disponibles en el sitio web del Departamento en los seis idiomas a partir del cual, cuando se hace clic, se proporcionará información sobre cómo acceder

a los servicios de asistencia de idiomas, así como una versión en PDF de Your Suffolk County Police Department. / Su Departamento de Policía del Condado de Suffolk.

### B. Servicios Para Asistencia de Idiomas

El Departamento de Policía del Condado de Suffolk tomará todas las medidas razonables para facilitar el acceso oportuno y significativo a los servicios y programas del Departamento, independientemente del idioma hablado por las personas que solicitan dicho servicio. Personal del Departamento proporcionará asistencia lingüística gratuita a todos los individuos LEP que están en necesidad de o lo soliciten tal asistencia. Personal del Departamento informara al público que todos los servicios de asistencia de idiomas están disponibles de forma gratuita. Miembros del Departamento adherirán a los siguientes procedimientos al asegurar servicios de interpretación:

- 1. De acuerdo con la dirección del Ejecutivo del Condado, el Departamento determinará los miembros que posean cualquier nivel de fluidez en un idioma que no sea inglés. Estos miembros serán evaluados por Servicio Civil (Civil Service) para determinar si cumplen con los estándares de competencia orales establecidos por Servicio Civil (Civil Service). El Comisionado de la Policía, o su designado, autorizarán estos miembros del Departamento para servir como DAI. Una lista corriente de todas las DAI y los idiomas que hablan se mantendrá en la oficina del Supervisor de la Sección de Comunicaciones (Communications Section Supervisor).
- 2. Miembros de Departamento que están en necesidad servicios de interpretación intentaran a identificar el idioma principal del individuo LEP, utilizando un Language Identification Chart / Tabla de Identificación de Idiomas si es necesario, y solicitaran al DAI apropiado a través del Supervisor de la Sección de Comunicaciones (Communications Section Supervisor). Si no hay un DAI disponible, el miembro de servicio contactara Language Line Service.
  - a. Circunstancias extremas: Personal del Departamento que tienen que comunicarse con personas LEP (personas con dominio de inglés limitado) en situaciones peligrosas o situaciones que se desarrollan rápidamente pueden utilizar de forma temporal cualquier intérprete disponible. Intérpretes temporales pueden incluyen:
    - i. Personal del Departamento bilingüe;
    - ii. Espectadores bilingüe. Miembros del Departamento que utilizan estos tipos de intérpretes temporales deberán de primero considerar el dominio aparente del intérprete seleccionado, tanto en la lengua de origen y objetiva, y considerarán también cualquier prejuicio aparente, interés personal, o problemas de confidencialidad formuladas por el uso de un intérprete temporal particular. Miembros del Departamento que utilizan estos tipos de intérpretes temporales son responsables de desarrollar y hacer todas las preguntas. Miembros también considerarán el grado en el que el intérprete



temporal parece ser neutral, o parece estar insertando su propio perspectivo o información en la comunicación.

- b. Se documentara el uso de intérpretes temporales de acuerdo con las Normas y Procedimientos Capitulo 26(5).
- c. Duración de la exigencia: Cuando han pasado las circunstancias que dieron lugar a la exigencia, miembros del Departamento deberán determinar si existe una necesidad continua de servicios de interpretación.
  - i. Si no se requiere ninguna otra interpretación, miembros deberán de revisar el contenido de la interpretación para exactitud y suficiencia.
  - ii. Si el contenido proporcionado por el intérprete temporal es incompleto, inexacto o de otra manera comprometido, o si la necesidad de servicios de interpretación se extiende más allá del período de exigencia, los miembros del Departamento deberán utilizar la lista de DAI, o Language Line Service.
- 3. Cuando correspondencia es recibida por el Departamento en un idioma distinto del inglés, será traducido al inglés. Una vez traducido, si la correspondencia se consideraría una denuncia, será remitida al Oficial Comandante de la Oficina de Asuntos Internos para ser investigada. El Departamento responderá a todas correspondencias en un momento oportuno.
- 4. El Informe de Agradecimiento/Reclamo (Compliment/Complaint Information Reports) del Departamento que están en otros idiomas aparte del inglés indicaran los servicios de interpretación que están disponibles en las instalaciones de Policía o por teléfono.
- 5. Todos los miembros del Departamento, tanto jurados como civiles, tienen acceso a los servicios de la línea de idiomas 24 horas al día, siete días a la semana. Language Line ofrece servicios de interpretación en más de 200 idiomas diferentes. Teléfonos con auriculares duales para su uso en la comunicación a través del servicio de intérpretes de Language Line se han instalado en las siguientes ubicaciones:
  - a. Recepción en cada precinto
  - b. Recepción en el cuartel general (Police Headquarters)
  - c. Sección de Control de Crimen (Crime Control Section) de cada precinto
  - d. Brigada de Detectives en cada precinto (Detective Squad)
  - e. Sección de Operaciones de Aeropuerto (Airport Operations Section)
  - f. Ventana publica de Central Records
  - g. Sección de Violencia Domestica (Domestic Violence Section)
  - h. Sección de Crímenes de Odio (Hate Crimes Section)
  - i. Sección de Homicidio (Homicide Section)
  - j. Oficina de Asuntos Internos (Internal Affairs Bureau)
  - k. Recepción de Oficina de Marina (Marine Bureau)
  - 1. Oficina de Marina Fire Island (dos teléfonos)
  - m. Oficina de Licencias de Pistola (Pistol Licensing Bureau)

- n. Academia de Policía Oeste (Police Academy Bureau West)
- o. Sección de Victimas Especiales (Special Victims Section)
- p. Oficina de Patrullaje Especial (Special Patrol Bureau)

Además, treinta y ocho carros de sector dentro de la División de Patrullas están equipados con teléfonos celulares programados para marcar automáticamente la línea de idiomas Language Line. Estos teléfonos celulares se han desplegado en las siguientes unidades de patrulla:

El condado ha contratado a Mill Neck Interpreter Service para obtener servicios de intérprete de lengua de señas para sordos y personas con problemas de audición. Intérpretes de lengua de señas responderán a lugares de incidentes o a instalaciones de la policía para ayudar en la comunicación. Los miembros del departamento pueden utilizar este servicio las 24 horas del día, siete días a la semana. El departamento de policía no está obligado a tener ningún equipo específico disponibles para utilizar este servicio. Primero los miembros deben llamar a Mill Neck al 516-512-6222 y siga las indicaciones de voz. Los oficiales deben luego conectarse a su sitio web en: <a href="http://www.millneck.org/services/interpreting/interpreting.html">http://www.millneck.org/services/interpreting/interpreting.html</a>, y luego completar la solicitud para servicios en el sitio web.

- 6. Miembros utilizando un DAI o cualquiera de los servicios de interpretación disponibles completarán el formulario de datos de seguimiento de interpretación, Interpretation Tracking Data Form PDCS 7042<sup>a</sup>, con toda información pertinente y presentarlo para la entrada en la base de datos de seguimiento del Departamento.
- 7. El Departamento actualmente mantiene 35 formas que están traducidas al español. Muchas de estas formas son incidente-específicas y no son vitales o esenciales documentos públicos, pero documentos de investigación. Miembros del Departamento deberán solicitar un DAI y documentar las respuestas de un individuo LEP en inglés.

### C. Entrenamiento

El Departamento llevará a cabo el entrenamiento anual para todos los miembros del Departamento en las políticas y procesos de LEP. Este entrenamiento se llevará a cabo para personal reclutar y en servicio e incluirá instrucción en clase, así como en videos y boletines de entrenamiento.



- El Departamento continuará proporcionando 20 horas de instrucción en Cultura Y Lengua Española en su Programa de Entrenamiento de Reclutas que incluirá las políticas y procesos de LEP.
- 2. Miembros en servicio, tanto jurados como civiles, recibirán entrenamiento anual en lo siguiente:
  - a. Como identificar las necesidades de idioma de un individuo LEP durante interacción en persona o por teléfono.
  - b. Como acceder Department Authorized Interpreters, interpretes autorizados del departamento, intérpretes de Language Line, y el uso de intérpretes durante circunstancias exigentes.
  - c. Como trabajar con intérpretes y evaluar la calidad del interprete.
  - d. Como tener en cuenta diversidad cultural y barreras de idioma en actuación policial.
  - e. Frases, términos y comandos básicos en español.
  - f. Actuación Policial Libre de Prejuicio, Sensibilidad Cultural, Delitos/Incidentes de Odio, Plan De Acceso de Idiomas y Dominio Limitado del Inglés.
  - A personal jurado se le expedirá un guía de español, inserto para el libro de notas (PDCS 7041), para asistirles en situaciones policiales involucrando individuales LEP.
  - 4. También se requiere que miembros del Departamento completen anualmente los siguientes entrenamientos, Decentralized Individualized In-Service Training (D.I.I.T.):
    - a. Simple Spanish Commands (DIIT) / Comandos Sencillos en Español 27 minutos
    - b. Language Line Services (DIIT) / Servicios de Lina de Idiomas 3:35 minutos

### D. Monitorización and Cumplimento

El Coordinador de Acceso de Idiomas (LAC) se encargará de la coordinación y ejecución del Plan de Acceso Idiomas del Departamento. Tales funciones se incluyen pero no se limitan a:

1. La evaluación de datos demográficos, revisión de datos de utilización de intérprete de servicios de acceso de idiomas contratados, así como datos del formulario de seguimiento de interpretación - Interpretation Tracking Data Form, PDCS - 7042 para determinar las necesidades cambiantes de la comunidad. El Departamento será guiado por la información recopilada para determinar qué cambios y modificaciones se deben hacer, qué documentos son designados como vital y los idiomas a los que se les debe traducir. El examen de todos los datos disponibles y la determinación de los seis idiomas distintos al inglés más comunes encontrados en el Distrito de Policía dirigirá el Departamento en la evaluación de la necesidad de traducir documentos del

Departamento a otros idiomas y / o la necesidad de servicios de interpretación adicionales.

- Consultar con organizaciones basadas en la comunidad cada año con el fin de determinar si hay otros idiomas en los que deben traducirse los documentos vitales.
- 3. Revisión de nuevos documentos creados por el Departamento y evaluando la necesidad de que sean traducidos a otros idiomas distintos al inglés.
- 4. Manteniendo la lista DAI del Departamento así como coordinando con el Departamento de Servicio Civil (Civil Service) para asegurar que miembros del Departamento en esta lista están certificados y recertificados según sea apropiado.
  - a. El Departamento implementara un método consistente con los estándares del Servicio Civil de Suffolk County / Suffolk County Civil Service para verificar el nivel de habilidad que un trabajador posee en idiomas aparte del inglés.
  - b. El Departamento establecerá un sistema de monitorización para garantizar intérpretes que autorizados mantengan un nivel de normas éticas.
- 5. La Oficina de Asuntos Internos del Departamento revisará y responderá a todas las quejas de acceso de idiomas. La Oficina también examinará todas las quejas recibidas por el Departamento en un idioma aparte del inglés para determinar si existen problemas sistémicos fundamentales.
  - a. La Oficina de Asuntos Internos periódicamente solicitara una lista de llamadas 9-1-1 que la Sección de Comunicaciones conecto a Language Line. Investigadores seleccionarán al azar un número predeterminado de llamadas para auditar con el fin de garantizar que los denunciantes estaban satisfechos con el servicio policial proporcionado.
  - 6. Si un miembro de este Departamento cree que un DAI está participando en un comportamiento poco ético, incluyendo la adición o la omisión de palabras, frases o contexto, que niega acceso significativo a un individuo LEP, ese miembro reportará inmediatamente dicha información a su supervisor inmediato en una correspondencia interna, Internal Correspondence, PDCS 2042. Esta correspondencia se enviará a través de la cadena del comando del supervisor inmediato a la Oficina del Comisionado de Policía donde una determinación se hará en referencia a la designación del miembro como un DAI.
  - 7. El Coordinador de Acceso de Idiomas del Departamento representará al Departamento en su colaboración con líderes de la comunidad latina, así como líderes de otras comunidades con poblaciones LEP significativas para asegurar la aplicación efectiva del Plan de Acceso de Idiomas del Departamento. La oficina de respuesta a la comunidad, Community Response Bureau, responderá a las preocupaciones de la comunidad sobre el plan, y ofrecerá ideas y estrategias para garantizar el acceso al idioma. La Oficina Community Response Bureau llevará a cabo una revisión para evaluar la eficacia, la precisión y la calidad de los servicios del plan.

- a. El <u>Community Response Bureau</u> llevará a cabo una encuesta semi-anual de grupos defensores de latinos y otros grupos defensores de minorías para medir la eficacia del Plan de Acceso de Idiomas del Departamento, así como otros programas e iniciativas del Departamento.
- b. El Community Response Bureau analizará los resultados de cada encuesta e implementara medidas, si es necesario, para mejorar el plan.
- c. Un reporte detallando el estudio, sus resultados y las acciones tomadas por el Departamento se publicarán en el sitio web del Departamento y en otros medios pertinentes y adecuados.

### **Avoiding Home Burglary**

Most criminals who burglarize homes are looking for an easy hit; a house that they can break into quickly, take something of value, and leave without being detected. Yes, there are professional burglars who can gain entry into almost any home if they want, however, most criminals who break into homes are opportunists who got lucky with an open widow or unlocked door. There's no fail-proof way to keep out a burglar, but every little bit of deterrence helps. Even if you can't afford a security system, you can take a few minutes to make your home a little safer – target harden your home. Some relatively simple steps will greatly decrease the odds of a break-in, which means you can enjoy a bit more peace of mind.

Once a burglar has selected a home to burglarize, most will spend no more than a minute trying to break in and less than five minutes inside. Most residential burglaries occur on the first or ground floor. The point of entry is usually made at the rear or by a side door; the second most common access is via the garage door. Most burglaries occur during daytime hours when homes are empty, and belong to two person households.

Now that you know a few facts about burglary, in order to out fox a burglar, you need to think like one. Here are a few questions a burglar would ask himself before he breaks into your home. Ask this yourself these questions.

If you were a burglar targeting your own home - how would you get in to your home? Evaluate your home from the inside and out, night and day. You might even try a "mock" break-in, trying window jambs and loose locks on your house's

perimeter. Be sure to let the neighbors know what you're up to before you go lurking in the bushes. Here are a few thoughts to harden your residence to burglars.

Lights

Even though most burglaries occur during the day, some occur during hours of darkness. Criminals are in search of houses with no one home. To reduce your home's risk of burglary at night, install motion lights in the front and in the rear of your house wherever possible. To be extra cautious, try to position the lights at the corners of your residence so the motion detectors can catch someone approaching from the side. Make sure the lights are positioned at a height that someone cannot disable them by easily reaching up and unscrewing the bulb.

Landscape

Make sure all shrubs and trees are trimmed back so they do not allow a burglar to conceal himself while attempting to open a window or door. If possible, plant bushes with prickly thorns around these locations, they are a cheap deterrent.

Scope out your yard

Don't stop your security awareness at the outside walls of your house. Your yard also deserves attention. In general, don't leave anything around the yard that might help a burglar get into your house. Ladders, stackable boxes or any garden tools should be put away, preferably in a locked cabinet. Many burglars have used the property owner's own tools to break into a home. Don't place outdoor furniture tables nearby the house. Drainpipes could become an easy stepladder to the second floor. Yes, criminals do climb up drainpipes. Think about it, most second story windows are left unsecured and make a house easy to gain entry to.

Hide your identity

Do not place your name on your mailbox or front door, especially if you are a woman. If you really have to do this, use your last name only.

Secure the windows

Though windows are relatively easy to break, the loud noise of shattering glass will deter a thief if you're near other houses.

Create a lock for wooden-frame windows. At the top edge of the bottom frame, drill two holes perpendicular to the sash or at a slight, downward angle. Drill completely through the inside sash and halfway into the outside sash. Insert nails or bolts (don't hammer or screw these) into the holes. To test this setup to make certain the bolts won't pop out when wiggled.

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Don't leave windows and doors open during the night whether you're home or away. This is a commonsense precaution, but a surprising number of people forget to do just that, especially second story windows. It's a good idea to make a "pane patrol" part of your ritual of leaving the house. Another option is to use a swege window alarm and stop. A swege is like a doorstop for windows. It's a device you place on windows you use for ventilation. It allows you to keep the window open (say 6-8 inches) for air. However, should anyone push the window further open the swege stops the window from sliding and emits an ear piercing alarm to scare the intruder away and to alert you of attempted entry.

Use a pick proof locking device for your windows. Make sure the frames are solid. If you're beyond the earshot of your neighbors, they won't hear the glass breaking. Consider installing a Plexiglas sheet for the more accessible windows. This will make entry through them more difficult.

Basement windows are an easy target, since they're low and usually well hidden. Firmly

wedge a steel bar across the window, or install a metal grate.

Secure the doors

All exterior doors should be solid core, and can withstand being kicked in. All should have high quality dead bolts with at least 1 1/2 inch throws on the bolts themselves. The bolts in the locks should always be solid, not hollow metal.

Insure the doorframe has a metal strike plate, which is secured by a minimum of six,

three inch screws, which are screwed into the solid door frame.

Install a wrap-a-round steel place on the front of the door which covers the deadbolt. This will provide extra protection from a burglar kicking in the door, and reducing his ability to pry the door lock.

If you don't have a peephole, install one in the front door. If you have one, make sure that you and your family are in the habit of using it. Don't open the door to anyone you don't know, especially at night. If the peephole is out of reach of your children, keep a

stepladder or stepping box by the door for them to use.

Dogs, even the small yip-yip variety, have sharp teeth and a way of noisily not welcoming stealthy intruders. But a dog is more than an organic alarm--it's a living creature, and it'll need a lifetime of love, care, attention and exercise. If you can genuinely welcome a dog into your life, it will welcome the task of protecting you. But if you're a cat person (or a guppy person) at heart, then look into electronic security systems.

The recording of a bark, as sometimes suggested, may only be effective for particularly gullible burglars. Some people have a playback system that's triggered by the doorbell, but the cause-and-effect (push, bark, push, bark) is a little too easy to discern. A Beware of Dog sign is better than nothing; for an added touch of verisimilitude, get a

# DMEM 11-93, Page 7 of 10 CRIME VICTIM INFORMATION



As a victim of crime in New York State you have rights. You may be eligible for compensation from the NYS Crime Victims Board for items such as: lost wages, medical expenses, counseling, funeral expenses, essential personal property, occupational rehabilitation, moving expenses or crime scene clean-up. Police and District Attorneys can help protect you against harassment and intimidation. If you are unsure as to which agency to contact, the Crime Victims Board can provide detailed information on compensation and services offered to crime victims. To obtain additional information on your rights as a crime victim and compensation applications, you can request a copy of "The Rights of Crime Victims in New York State" booklet at a Police Department Facility or by contacting the Crime Victims Board at:

Whenever a non-U.S. citizen is arrested, the arresting officer <u>must</u>, without delay, offer to notify a consular official of the arrest regardless of mandatory notification requirements.

Pursuant to U.S. State Department guidelines, a consular officer may visit a foreign national from their country that is in police custody.

As a non-U.S. citizen who is being arrested or detained, you are entitled to have us notify your country's consular representatives here in the United States. A consular official from your country may be able to help you obtain legal counsel, and may contact your family and visit you in detention, among other things. If you want us to notify your country's consular officials, you can request this notification now, or at any time in the future. After your consular officials are notified, they may call or visit you. Do you want us to notify your country's consular officials?
